# consequent

I. happening as a result of a particular event or situation

Weather forecasters predicted heavy rain and consequent flooding.

Falling sales and a consequent loss of profits forced the company to lay off more workers.





### construct

I. to build something such as a house, bridge, road etc.

The city plans to construct more roads.



2. to make or create (something, such as a story or theory) by organizing ideas, words, etc.


The author constructs all the stories around one theme.



#### consume

I. to use time, energy, goods etc.

Smaller cars consume less fuel.



2. if a feeling or idea consumes you, it affects you very strongly, so that you cannot think about anything else

He was consumed with guilt after the accident.



## credit

- I. an arrangement with a shop, bank etc that allows you to buy something and pay for it later

  Most new cars are bought on credit.
- 2. approval or praise that you give to someone for something they have done

### culture

I. the beliefs, way of life, art, and customs that are shared and accepted by people in a particular society

In our culture, it is rude to ask someone how much they earn.



2. a society that existed at a particular time in history

The Egyptian culture relied upon the Nile Delta.



# design

I. the art or process of making a drawing of something to show how you will make it or what it will look like

The new plane is in its final design stage.



2. a pattern for decorating something

The sofa is covered in a lovely, floral-design fabric.



## distinct

I. clearly different or belonging to a different type

Although they share many things in common,

Portuguese and Spanish are two entirely distinct

languages.

2. used to make it clear that you are not referring to a particular kind of thing, but to something else Kim Kardashian is a TV star, as distinct from an actor.





### element

I. one part or feature of a whole system, plan, piece of work etc, especially one that is basic or important

Honesty is a vital element of her success.



2. an amount, usually small, of a quality or feeling:

There is an element of truth in your argument.



# equate

I. to consider that two things are similar or connected

Most people equate wealth with success.



2. o be equal to something:

With benefits, he receives a rate of pay which equates to \$40.00 an hour.



# evaluate

I. to judge how good, useful, or successful something is; assess

You should be able to evaluate your own work.

We need to evaluate the success of the campaign.
