MODALS

Modals are those helping verbs, which express the 'mode' or 'manner' of the actions indicated by the main verbs. They express modes such as ability, possibility, probability, permission, obligation, etc.

The most commonly used modals are shall, should, will, would, can, could, may, might, must, ought to, used to, need and dare.

Modals are used to:

1. Ask permission-may, can, could

Examples: May I come in?

Could I use your pen, please?

2. Make a request—can, could

Examples: Could you please give me the doctor's telephone number?

Can I borrow a pencil?

3. Express a possibility—may, might, could

Examples: It might rain during the night.

She could become a great singer some day.

4. Give advice or a suggestion—should

Examples: You should exercise more.

You shouldn't smoke.

5. Express necessity—must, have to

Examples: We must slow down while driving in front of a school.

I have to submit my project by tomorrow.

6. Express prohibition – must not, may not

Examples: You must not talk loudly in the library.

You may not be rude to the teacher.

7. Express a promise or intention—will, shall

Example: I will mail you my address.

8. Express a wish—may

Example: May you have a long life!
